Dear Parents and Carers,

Spensley Street Primary School is looking forward to another great year of teaching and learning, and we would like to advise you of Spensley Street Primary School's voluntary financial contribution for 2026.

Background:

Victorian schools provide students with free instruction to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements, and we want to assure you that all contributions are voluntary. Nevertheless, the ongoing support of our families ensures that our school can continue to offer the best possible education, facilities and support for our students. We want to thank you for all your support, whether that's through fundraising or volunteering your time. This continues to make a huge difference to our school and the programs we can offer.

A free public education in Victoria means that Victorian government schools must teach the standard curriculum to all students for free. This covers Prep to Year 12. Each school receives funding from the government to teach the standard curriculum. This funding pays for

- staff to do the teaching and run the school;
- the basic building and current facilities; and
- extra support for children with a disability.

All schools in Victoria are funded by the Department of Education and Training (DET) based on the number of students who attend the school, and according to socioeconomic criteria (the Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage-ICSEA).

As Spensley Street ranks very high on the ICSEA Index, this directly affects our school funding as the higher the ranking, the less government funding we receive.

Parent Contribution Arrangements for 2026:

Locally raised funds are critical to Spensley Street to provide students with the wider variety of programs and resources we enjoy, along with ensuring that our school facilities are up to date and well-maintained. The voluntary parent contributions are a very important way that we raise those funds.

A detailed schedule of parent contributions is presented on the next page. These fees have been increased by 3% in line with the CPI. Contributions to the Building Fund are tax-deductible.

Payment Method:

The Compass Course Confirmation / School Payments module allows you to pay online by card. Payment may be made in full or by establishing a payment plan. You can select this as an option in the payment section. This will be open for payment in January 2026.

Financial Support for Families:

Spensley Street prides itself on being an inclusive community where all children are provided with the best education regardless of their financial circumstances. If your family is experiencing financial hardship or holds a means-tested Centrelink card please speak with the principal about payment options in early 2026

PARENT PAYMENTS POLICY

ONE PAGE OVERVIEW



FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.



PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

- Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

- Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
